com•po•tier (French: kom pō tyā) A dish, usually of glass, china, or silver, having a base, stem, and often a lid, and is used for serving fruit, nuts, or candy, etc. Also called a compote.

Here's an easy pattern with a fancy look. This is an excellent pattern to use with some of those fancy floral or oriental fabrics. Many compotiers were made of china and had large floral motifs on them. You could also use a marbled gray for the lid and stem and then use a fruit or candy fabric for the bowl part. This block would also work well in one of those bookshelf quilts that are so popular now.
